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
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
'Failure to Act' by Congress and the Legislature loses skills and jobs

Regrettably, the members of the US Congress and the Pennsylvania Legislature have both neglected our nation's infrastructure over the past year.


Despite the recommendations of Governor Corbett's blue-ribbon Transportation Funding Advisory Committee (TFAC), the PA legislature was unable to fund the long-overdue maintenance to our existing roads and bridges. These upgrades are critical for improving our state's facilities to meet today's and tomorrow's needs.

On the federal level, the federal gas has not been adjust for inflation in over two decades. Despite this fact, Congress has made no headway in funding our nation's infrastructure in the long-term. In





Our failure to invest hurts both our national and state economies. Such inaction means that highly skilled construction workers, designers, and engineers are leaving Pennsylvania for opportunities elsewhere.



The longer we wait to act, the more it will cost. For example, what cost more: fixing a pothole or closing a lane of a highway? ASCE's Failure to Act studies show that we are already paying for our inaction. The studies conclude that if America continues down its current path on infrastructure investment, America will lose \$3.1 trillion in GDP, \$1.1 trillion in trade value, and 3.5 million jobs—all by 2020.

We have a great illustration of these costs in the civil engineering profession. Look at how many of your colleagues are no longer employed in civil engineering. In Pennsylvania, during the 2012 Construction season,

the unemployment rate for construction workers was over 20 percent! Many of the jobs in energy resources were filled by workers from other states who migrated to Pennsylvania, and not by those displaced because of the Failure to Act of our lawmakers.

The longer we wait to act, the more it will cost future generations. Infrastructure is the foundation of our communities, and is vital for economic growth. Americans need officials at all levels of government to lead on job sustaining and economic revival infrastructure issues now!

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

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


gas industry, offering access to new sources of hydrocarbon fuels that hold the promise of energy independence for the United States.

federal level in response to the rapid industry growth.





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
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Civil and Environmental Engineers have as their core mission the protection of the public health, safety, and welfare.

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TMDL PART 2

In the last newsletter article TMDLs (Total Maximum Daily Loads) were introduced, and why one should be interested.

TMDLs on water bodies were compared to the total load that could be applied to a bridge, with background loads, applied loads, and a safety factor.

To determine what load a water body could carry, background information is collected in an Aquatic Life Use survey (ALU survey) on the ability of the organisms in the water body to withstand the pollutants and nutrients loaded into the water body. This process was compared to collecting geologic and survey information on a site where a bridge to serve people is proposed.

This introduction is based on a presentation made to members of the Environmental and Water Resources Institute in the Pittsburgh Section of ASCE by Bill Brown, Chief of the TMDL Development Section in the Division of Watershed Protection of the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection.

The ALU survey is part of monitoring particular watersheds to evaluate the impacts. In the Watershed based approach to monitoring

- Sampling locations are placed to integrate and detect impacts not at just one place, but throughout a watershed
- Data collection at each site consists of benthic macroinvertebrates and physical habitat
- Thorough reconnaissance of watershed to document potential sources and causes of impairment (nonattainment of ALU).

Data collected is then analyzed to determine whether Aquatic Life Uses are attained. To avoid bias or

skewed results, the water professionals who analyze the data use not just one, but a multi-metric approach:

- Biological metrics measure a specific component of the biological community
- 6 biological metrics comprise the Pa DEP Index of Biotic Integrity for freestone riffle/run streams
- The index is on a 100 point scale with 0 being worst and 100 being best
 - 1. Total Taxa Richness
 - 2. EPT Taxa Richness
 - 3. Beck's Index

- 4. Shannon Diversity
- 5. Hilsenhoff Biotic Index
- 6. Percent Sensitive Individuals

Benthic Macroinvertebrates



- Evaluate or Assess the stream or lake
 - Include on Pennsylvania's Impaired Waters List those water bodies that are found to be water quality limited.
 - Establish the TMDL to address the impairments for which the water is listed
- Implement the TMDL
- Reassess the waters check your work!
