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# ENGINEERS WITHOUT BORDERS CONTINUES ITS MISSION IN ECUADOR

Tingo Pucara is a village sculptured deep in the Ecuadorian Andean Mountains 12,000 feet above sea level; surrounded by Nature's most aesthetic beauty, rich in culture and history. The land was inhabited by the Inca Empire during the 13th century. Several "Pucaras" (meaning fortress) were built by the Inca's as part of their colonization of the villages in the Chinchaysuyu region.

The inhabitants of Tingo Pucara (meaning small fortress) are Quichua indigenous descendants of those who populated the region during the Inca's domination and later on survived the Spanish colonization. They have lived in this arid but beautiful land surrounded by the historic "Pucara" ruins for centuries. The people preserved some of their ancestors' Inca Era traditions, and continue to farm the lands and breed llamas, sheep and alpacas.

Unfortunately, the community of Tingo Pucara is like the 2.5 billion people without proper sanitation and 1 billion people without access to clean water in our world. Moreover, their closest source of natural spring water is approximately 2 miles away from their homes.

The process of getting water for their families is long and tedious. Villagers (mostly women and children) have to carry water tubs that can hold about 10 liters or 3 gallons of water from the source. The average time it takes to bring water to their homes is about six hours each day. As a result, Tingo Pucara is stricken with poverty and battling with difficulties in getting enough water to homes and suffering water-related diseases with one in five young children fatally affected.

The Engineers Without Borders Pittsburgh Professional Chapter (EWB-PPC), with the assistance of Dr. Fernando Ortega, Director of Integrated Community Development of the Universidad San Francisco de Quito, Ecuador, is partnering with the community of Tingo Pucara on a sanitation, water supply and purification project. This partnership will last a minimum of five years, which is EWB-USA National's standard for all EWB projects aimed to improve success rates on their projects in the developing world.

In August 2009, EWB-PPC and student members of EWB-University of Pittsburgh and EWB-CMU embarked on another journey to Tingo Pucara for a second site assessment trip (initial site assessment trip occurred in the fall of 2008) with the purpose to accomplish the following goals:

- Re-establish connection with the Tingo Pucara community
- Report our first assessment findings to Tingo Pucara and get their feedback
- Provide water filter and sanitation education
- Obtain additional data on land survey, geotechnical and water
- Construct a rain catchment system to supplement the water supply

The EWB-PPC team lived with the community of Tingo Pucara for eight days. Each day the EWB-PPC and Tingo Pucara worked side-by-side on the construction of the rain catchment system and data collection. Each night Tingo Pucara invited EWB-PPC to have a closer look at their rich Quichuan culture, singing traditional songs and cooking potato soup meals from agriculture crops, herbs and spices grown on their land. Each tradition reinforcing the heart of Tingo Pucara: Family,

Community, Future.

Now returned 2 months, EWB-PPC data evaluation, analysis and design work for a sustainable solution continues. The project is not without its complexities; besides the distance to water, the elevation to water is 1,000 feet down requiring energy to pump the water up. Tingo Pucara's economic resources are extremely limited (living on an average of 2 dollars a day for a family of 5). This requires EWB-PPC to incorporate design criteria which practically eliminates the costs of maintenance. An error here would result fiscally in a bankrupted community or an abandoned system, ultimately a failed project.

EWB-PPC is focusing research and design work on renewable energy solutions, such as solar energy or a hybrid solution like combining solar and wind power. This is the largest "green project" the Tingo Pucara have ever been part of. The challenges and complexities make the task seem daunting; however, the benefit will be everlasting.

"We have a dream, and our dream is not for ourselves but for our children. We want to provide our children the means to be able to grow up healthy and happy. Live on the land of our ancestors and have happy and healthy children of their own", people of Tingo Pucara told us through our translator.

In the end, our work and its success will be measured by our ability to realize Tingo Pucara's dream. The world can look at what has been done here and learn that the challenge is not in development through sustainable technologies, but to have the courage and passion to do so.

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
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# TAKING NOMINATIONS FOR WESTERN PENNSYLVANIA'S FINEST ASCE MEMBERS

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
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#### PA SECTIONS TO UPDATE THE PA INFRASTRUCTURE REPORT CARD IN 2010

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# NEW ASCE PITTSBURGH WEBSITE UNVEILED


